Haze Gray and Underway

Hand Salute

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Jim Inhofe (R-Oklahoma) today praised the passage by unanimous consent of his bill (S.1877) clarifying U.S. law to allow veterans and servicemen not in uniform to salute the Flag.

Current law (US Code Title 4, Chapter 1) states that veterans and servicemen not in uniform should place their hand over their heart without clarifying whether they can or should salute the Flag.

"The salute is a form of honor and respect, representing pride in one's military service, Senator Inhofe said. "Veterans and service members continue representing the military services even when not in uniform. Unfortunately, current U.S. law leaves confusion as to whether veterans and service members out of uniform can or should salute the Flag. My legislation will clarify this regulation, allowing veterans and servicemen alike to salute the flag, whether they are in uniform or not.

"I look forward to seeing those who have served saluting proudly at baseball games, parades, and formal events. I believe this is an appropriate way to honor and recognize the 25 million veterans in the United States who have served in the military and remain as role models to others citizens. Those who are currently serving or have served in the military have earned this right, and their recognition will be an inspiration to others.

This Bill was passed July 25, 2007. Please let your veteran friends know about the passage of this Bill.



James E. Gallo

Fire Control Technician G First Class James E. "Jim" Gallo, U.S. Navy retired, 79, passed away Sept. 10, 2007, in Sentara Leigh Hospital. He was predeceased by his father, Michael Gallo; his mother, Caroline Gallo; and his brother, Eugene Gallo. A native of Adena, Ohio, Jim honorably served his country in the U.S. Navy from 1948 to 1973. During his long naval career, he served aboard the USS Missouri, USS Newport News, USS Berry, USS Magoffin, USS Sylvania and the USS Canisteo. He was one of the two sailors selected from the entire USS Navy to test the Vulcan Gun System aboard the USS Canisteo. Jim was assigned to shore duty in Orange, Texas, shore duty at Little Creek, Va., and instructor duty at Dam Neck Training Center, Va. He retired from AMSU at Little Creek. He was a member of Fleet Reserve Association Branch 5 and the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post No. 4809. For many years, Jim was a waiter/night manager at the Breezy Point Club, NAS Norfolk and a bartender at the Helm/456 Club, Little Creek Amphibious Base. After he retired from the U.S. Navy he worked for Yates Business Systems and Remco Business Systems. Jim is survived by Phana, his wife of 55 years; his son, James E. "Jim" (Deborah) Gallo Jr. of Montclair, Va.; two daughters, Sarita (Christopher) Bizjak of Culpeper, Va., and Felicia Gayda of Fairfax, Va.; Jim will be deeply missed but never forgotten by his family and friends who cherished him for his sweet, gentle, loving, kind and selfless nature. The Gallo family would like to express their gratitude to all the doctors, nurses and medical personnel who took such great care of Jim during his illness. Jim's family would also like to thank all of their friends for their prayers, love and support during this most difficult time. A memorial service to celebrate Jim's life will be held in St. John's United Methodist Church at 11 a.m. today. The Rev. E. Clifton Whitlock will officiate at the service. Jim donated his body for scientific research. In lieu of flowers, the family suggests that memorial donations be made to the American Lung Association or to St. John's United Methodist Church Capital Improvement Fund, 2709 Green-dale Ave., Norfolk, VA 23518.

Former Skipper Update

Thanks to Mike Stein, our president and an inveterate Googler, here is some information about one of the Magoffin's former skippers.

JAMES F. BRADLEY, JR. - He was graduated from USNA in June 1944 as an Ensign. After Amphibious Training he was spot promoted to full Lieutenant and took command of USS *LST890*. He made a logistic landing at Iwo Jima and on April 1, 1945 was in the first beaching wave at Okinawa. He was relieved and reported to staff (COMPHIBPAC) and participated in planning for the invasion of Japan. (Operation Olympic) After WW-II he served as Aide to COMJOINTASK ONE) and observed the nuclear bomb tests at Bikini Atoll. In 1947, he attended Submarine school and served in USS *Sablefish* (SS303). He was later Executive Officer USS *Cobler* and commanded USS *Guavina* (AGSS362) USS *Batfish* (SS303). He then served as Executive Officer U.S. Naval Submarine Base, New London, CT. when the Polaris system became operable. He was appointed to U.S. Embassy, Bonn, Germany as assistant Naval Attaché. During the Vietnam War he commanded USS *Magoffin* (APA-199) and made 3 landings of Marines to support U.S. Army on Operations Hammer and Anvil. He was assigned to the Intelligence Division of OPNAV and became the director of Undersea Warfare in ONI. He was also the Navy representative on the National Undersea Reconnaissance Office (NURO). He was responsible for all Submarine Special Ops world wide. He retired in February, 1974 and went to work for Westinghouse Electric Corp. and served in Europe as the senior vice president of Europe, Mid-East and North Africa. He retired from Westinghouse in 1988 after living in Europe for 16 years. He is married to the former Miss Peggy Roedlett of Pehlam, NJ and they have two daughters, Ricky and Gayle.

His significant decorations are: Distinguished Service Cross, Legion of Merit (2), U.S. Navy Commendation Medals (2) and the Service Cross, First Class, of the Republic of Germany.

A True Story

Back in September of 2005, on the first day of school, Martha Cothren, a social studies school teacher at Robinson High School in Little Rock, did something not to be forgotten. On the first day of school, with the permission of the school superintendent, the principal and the building supervisor, she removed all of the desks out of her classroom.

When the first period kids entered the room they discovered that there were no desks. Looking around, confused, they asked, "Ms. Cothren, where're our desks?" She replied, "You can't have a desk until you tell me what you have done to earn the right to sit at a desk."


They thought, "Well, maybe it's our grades." No," she said. "Maybe it's our behavior." She told them, "No, it's not even your behavior." And so, they came and went, the first period, second period, third period. Still no desks in the classroom. By early afternoon, television news crews had started gathering in Ms. Cothren's classroom to report about this crazy teacher who had taken all the desks out of her room.

The final period of the day came and as the puzzled students found seats on the floor of the desk-less classroom, Martha Cothren said, "Throughout the day no one has been able to tell me just what he/she has done to earn the right to sit at the desks that are ordinarily found in this classroom. Now I am going to tell you." At this point, Martha Cothren went over to the door of her classroom and opened it. Twenty-seven (27) U.S. Veterans, all in uniforms, walked into that classroom, each one carrying a school desk. The Vets began placing the school desks in rows, and then they would walk over and stand along side the wall.

By the time the last soldier had set the final desk in place, those kids started to understand, perhaps for the first time in their lives, just how the right to sit at those desks had been earned.

Martha said, "You didn't earn the right to sit at these desks. These heroes did it for you. They placed the desks here for you. Now, it's up to you to sit in them. It is your responsibility to learn, to be good students, to be good citizens. They paid the price so that you could have the freedom to get an education. Don't ever forget it."

Thanks to Jim Earvin for sending this along. This is a true story that happened in Arkansas. The teacher, Martha Cothren, was voted the V.F.W. teacher of the year in 2006.
